




I. Six UFO photographs by Apolinar "Paul" Villa

Aside from Meier's Beamship photos, Villa's are perhaps the most iconic example of Flying Saucer photography of all time. Hoaxed? Never quite definitively debunked. But what's a hoax anyway? A ritual? Original prints are incredibly uncommon. These feature the correct age-identifying point ("A Kodak Paper" printed on backs), and have an interesting historical provenance. 2. Cooper, Milton William. The Secret Government: The Origin, Identity, and Purpose of MJ-12.

Author self published, 1989. 8.5 by 11. Corner stapled, title and copyright information as cover page. Unpaginated, 27 pp, printed rectos only. Near Fine with some light age to pages and very mild evidence of having been read/thumbed through. First Edition. Rare. Best known for his hugely popular Behold a Pale Horse, Cooper was an infamous and legendary figure in late 20th century American conspiracy culture. This document is an original 1990s copy of his early ufological essay, a study of the so-called MJ12 papers. It covers much of the terrain later incorporated into BAPH, but through a more UFO-centric lens. It is quite scarce both in the trade and institutionally, OCLC locates only one copy.

3. UFO painting by Keith Berdak



This is a relatively early painting, and its ufological subject (an US military jet chasing a rather groovy looking flying saucer) sets it apart from his body of work.

Corner stapled, 8.5 by II, 49 pp. Rare. Early journal by Valdamar Valerian, AKA John Grace, author of the Matrix books and Krill Papers. His Nevada Aerial Research Journal / Newsletter eventually rebranded as The Leading Edge. This issue includes writings by Valerian as well as the mysterious TAL figure, Lucien Commetta, and Jean Francoise Gille. Titles include: Why Are Some Researchers "Dropping Out"?; The New Project Blue Book; Testing of Super Science ELF Generator, more. OCLC finds no copies of any issues of this issue, this publication, or the later Leading Edge newsletters.



4.2 July 1989

Corner staple, 27 pp. Rare. This issue includes a piece by UFO personality William Hamilton, as well as writings by Valerian and photocopied articles. Titles include: "Military Spaceflights and Alien Spacecraft", The Planetary Control Game, Worldwide Reported and Probable Abductions.




4.3 November 1989

Corner staple, 43 pp. Arcturus Special Edition.. This issue covers the War on Drugs, Soviet espionage, subcutaneous implants, a South African UFO crash, an abductee questionnaire, an installment of Valerian's "Conversation between researchers" column, and more.



4.4 December '89 / January '90

Corner staple, 51 pp. An early issue of The Leading Edge, just after Valerian's rebrand from the Nevada Aerial Research Group Newsletter. Indeed, this issue still bears both titles. Valerian, AKA John Grace, was the author of the infamous Matrix books and Krill Papers. OCLC locates no holdings of The Leading Edge or the NARG Newsletters. This issue features "Intelligence Highlights" and the usual array of conspiracy subculture preoccupations: Mae Brussel, Intercerebral Implants, Cashless Society, NSA, and, notably, an interview with John Lear from November 1989.




4.5 October (?) 1990

Corner stapled, 101 pp. An undated issue, presumed October 1990. Rare. This issue includes writings by Valerian as well as his pseudonym O.H. Krill, and includes articles such as "Alternative Three and Spaceship Moon," with a general issue-wide focus on moon conspiracies and the infamous Alternative Three hoax, alongside the usual conspiratorial menagerie.



5. Valerian, Valdamar. The Leading Edge, Issues 53 through 58.

1993. A six issue run of the newsletter by Valdamar Valerian AKA John Grace, personage behind the infamous Matrix series and Krill Papers. Valerian's concerns include a wide selection of classic conspiracy and fringe subculture subjects: UFOs, mind control, government assassination coverups, financial crime, libertarian and paranoid perspectives on 90s political events (Waco, for example), CIA tampering in counterculture movements, free energy, fringe physics, and more. Originally the Nevada Aerial Research Group newsletter, Valerian rebranded as The Leading edge in the early 1990s as his concerns shifted with those of many ufologists toward a more conspiratorial miscellany. These six issues feature photocopied news articles alongside original writings by VV and those he commissioned. Issues: 53 (128 pp.), 54 (126 pp.), 55 (104 pp.), 56 (103 pp.), 57 (105 pp.), 58 (103 pp.). Stapled twice at edges, covers detailing contents. All in near fine condition, with just hints of aging to paper, most notably some very mild age discoloration to issue 54. Institutionally quite rare, with OCLC locating no copies of any Leading Edge issues, though the Matrix books are held at several institutions.



The fourth installment in Valerian's Matrix series, a massive undertaking spanning fringe technology, ufology, mind control conspiracy theorizing, and just about everything else the conspiracy subculture was slinging in the 1990s. An interesting approach, somewhere between sampling (photocopying, often without acknowledgment) and original or commissioned writings.






7. Macer-Story, Eugenia. Congratulations! The UFO Reality.

Crescent Publications, 1978. 118 pp perfect bound in wraps. Near Fine minus, small stain to edges of several pages. Spine without creasing, light stress crease to wraps at binding fold, very light general wear to wraps. A frankly beautiful copy of this first book by the prolific and widely talented paranormal theorist, psychic, artist, poet, and playwright. This book documents Macer-Story's early investigations into the psychic dimension of UFO encounters, initiated by her own experience. A scarce and singularly insightful piece of ufological literature, and an important work in an oeuvre that deserves serious attention.








Typewritten, hand corrected and annotated pages including glued in illustrations (photos, etc.), handwritten captions, and illustrated cover/title page. Signed by the editor/author. An incredible, if skeptical, piece from the ufological subculture of the 1980s. The issue mainly comprises Graham's refutations of various claims of an alien presence on earth's moon.

185, Nov. 14. In Forli (Italy) a strange beam of red light, apparently emitted by some flying machine, was reported sweeping the countryside. As it illuminated two tractors, one of them stalled, but the other a diesel continued. The beam was seen for

188, Nov. 28. Two truck drivers form their road blocked between Caracas and Petare (Venezuela) by a luminous sphere over three metres in diameter, hovering two metres above ground. Coming out of the truck they met a small creature with claws and glowing eyes coming towards them. One of the witnesses, named Gonzales, grabbed the being, found it surprisingly light (about 35 pounds) and observed its body was very hard and covered with fur. The creature pushed him back with one hand in spite of its small weight. The second truck driver rushed to the police. Two more creatures emerged from the brush and leaped into the sphere, carrying stones and other samples, while the first individual attacked Gonzales again. Now terrified, he tried to defend himself with a knife, but the blow did no harm to the hard skin of the entity. 



In January, 1965, it was reported that an object had fallen from the sky at San Rafael, four kilometres from San Miguel, and a photograph of it appeared later in FLYING SAUCER REVIEW for May/June, 1965. The object, whatever it was, was subsequently removed by the Argentine Air Force. Most folk thought it was a satellite of some kind, but a few inhabitants of the area were convinced that it was a UFO and several said they had seen small individuals, near the object, who wore "strange divers' suits" which gave off a greenish phosphorescence. The case is therefore listed here for the record. record.








11. Kannenberg, Ida M. How To Come to Terms with Your UFO/Alien Encounter.

No writing aside from pencil price to illustrated endpaper. An early edition of Kannenberg's first book, featuring stunning illustrations by contactee Julie Wilkinson. A workbook in the pop-psychological mode (with an alien twist) aiming to help those who have had UFO or anomalous contact experiences. A valuable and fascinating glimpse into the early alien abduction subculture and phenomenon. Quite rare, with very few copies produced.

The following three pieces are writings by a woman who refers to herself as "Linda Herbert" and "Linda Blacksmith" in the two binder manuscripts (novels, ostensibly) cataloged below. I have been unable to determine the author's real name, so "Linda" seems as good as any for attribution. The third piece is an apparently exhaustive list of every kind of food. These are a quintessential example of "obsessive" writing, and I'm very excited to share them here. Enjoy.



45. Linda "Herbert". Lace Binder.

11.5 by 11.5 three-ring binder containing manuscript on lined paper. 763 pages, chiefly handwritten in blue and black pen with several pages of collage from newspapers and cookbooks. Whiteout used where appropriate throughout. Binder hand altered by the writer with lace cloth. Each page is hand numbered, the manuscript is divided into 60 numbered chapters. The manuscript is a minute examination of the daily life of "Linda Herbert," with chapters often beginning "Got up, did my things..." then continuing into the excruciating details of Linda's life. There is an emphasis on obsessive list-making, and the narrative of the text (such as it is) often diverts itself into lists of objects Linda either buys for a project (woodworking tools, for instance) or writes down from memory. Food is mentioned often, and recipes and collaged clippings make many appearances in the text (see #47 for a more food-centric Linda composition). Notable in this manuscript is a detailed description of Linda's family trip to Disneyland, with her clinical recitation of the events of the trip. An impressively durational exercise is life-cataloging by an unknown American woman, and a prime example of the curious value of outsider literature. \$750










46. Linda "Blacksmith." Pink Binder.

This "novel," like the above, though about twice as long, is an obsessive cataloging and narrativizing of Linda's daily habits, routines, and thought processes. The sheer stubbornness of its compositional simplicity and length, paired with the effect of reading Linda's script, makes for an almost hallucinatory reading experience. Lists and digressions abound in this work, as in its sister work. Disneyland is visited again. There have been many candidates for America's James Joyce. Let's be serious and nominate Linda. A truly monumental work of quotidian graphomania.





Unlike her manuscripts in binders, this piece has no narrative or grounding in events, but is a purely obsessive graphomaniacal list, broken into categories (types of bread, oats, fruits, kinds of muffins, coffees, etc). The liberal use of whiteout throughout gives the pages an art-object look, and the breadth and intensity of the listing impulse here is both impressive and ultimately confusing. What makes this writing an example of "obsessive" art is a combination of its practical uselessness (this sort of thing has no real application in the culinary world, does it?) and its thoroughness. A frankly astonishing piece of writing for the connoisseur of the strange.




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
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


